


GreenSAGEVert


Good-bye and Good Luck!

Community Action

On **Refugee Rights Day** and throughout the month of April, MCM staff and board members joined fellow advocates in front of the Prime Minister's office to protest the expansion of the **Safe Third Country Agreement.**

As part of ongoing actions, MCM supervising lawyer Rick Goldman and staffer Peter Butler walked from Montreal to the US border at Roxham Road in June. Dozens of refugees, advocates and supporters marched for three days, in sometimes miserable weather, in favour of refugee rights and against the closure of the border to asylum-seekers.

On October 21st, MCM rallied with Amnesty International, Quebec unions, politicians, migrant farm workers and non-profit organizations, in support of undocumented migrants.









In January, the McGill Faculty of Law organized a week of activities for students to learn about working with marginalized populations. On Jan. 6, Peter Butler hosted a group of 25 students at MCM to talk about the services our clinics offer, as well as about refugee protection more broadly. Then on Jan. 9, Rick Goldman spoke to the entire first-year class about his work with vulnerable clients in different community settings, and the challenges and rewards of such work.

Last Spring, Peter Butler and Olga Houde gave a 3-hour training session on 'resources for refused refugee claimants' to three different cohorts of 20 non-profits each. Feedback was very positive, so on November 2, Peter and Rick Goldman will be presenting this session again. Past participants, from all across Quebec, have sometimes followed up with the clinic to ask about complicated cases they have seen in their practice for which there are no local organizations available to help.

Danaïdes: Research ... Advocacy ... Public Awareness

The pilot we presented to you last year is starting to take shape as the **Danaïdes Project**: **Diversity without Discrimination.**

Our three main goals are:

- To raise awareness and educate civil society about the obstacles, prejudices, and discrimination that migrants without status or with precarious status face constantly;
- To advocate for a regularization program promised by the federal government in 2021, but not yet in existence;
- To highlight, through a research and advocacy project, the hurdles and difficulties that migrants without status or with precarious status encounter when trying to access justice.



Research

We have already put together a research team of academics from **Université de Montréal**, **Universities: McGill, Laval, Concordia, Ottawa**, and **InterAction and SHERPA** research institutes.

Advocacy

For a greater impact, we established a steering committee, representing different non-profit organizations serving vulnerable migrants to collaborate on the research and advocacy elements of the project.

The **Danaïdes** team has also produced an initial **research paper** on 'Access to justice for vulnerable migrants', that was presented to the **Quebec National Assembly** earlier this fall.
