This story is also an eloquent testimony to the power of hope, perseverance and parental love in the context of family separation.

A family includes different generations but not under Canadian immigration law. There is currently no automatic right for reunification of extended families. In this case former Just Solutions staffer Andrea Dawes helped "Granny" Ines (left) to sponsor her daughter Kirna (right) and granddaughter Zoe (centre), based on humanitarian and compassionate considerations. Kirna and Zoe arrived in Montreal from Gabon in June.

After repeated harassment and violence, Cecile was forced to flee her home country of Burundi in 2011, leaving her husband and family behind.

Her refugee claim was accepted in Canada in 2012, Sadly her husband died in 2014 before they could be reunited. The Snelling Clinic is working with Cecile on a humanitarian and compassionate application to enable her eldest daughter to come to Canada.

Coping with Grief and Loss

In May, new MCM staffer Evelyn Miller led a series of conversations at the Manoir St-Francis in Lennoxville entitled:

"Learning to Dance in the Rain-Living with Loss".

The 6 sessions centered on the many challenges participants faced, from difficult decisions regarding their loved ones to limitations imposed by chronic illness, as well as individual strategies for maintaining an affirming way of life.

The initial group, ranging in age from 80 to 93, now wants to act as mentors for the next group!
